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Episodes

Episode 1. Lake Titicaca, Peru

Peru is a high-altitude, rough and rugged, yet incredibly beautiful country to travel through. Our chosen mode of transport in Peru is hitch-hiking (in the back of trucks only!) and our destination is Lake Titicaca, the world's highest in-land lake (3,812 m or 12,500 ft) on the border of Peru and Bolivia. There are 42 artificial islands on the lake made of floating reeds that can be moved at will in case of threats. These islands as most of Peru are sparsely inhabited and locals support tourism by hosting travelers in their homes. We hitch-hike from the ancient Inca capitol of Cusco, down the spine of the Andes Mountains to Lake Titicaca, and along the way we suffer acute mountain sickness from the high altitude, get mixed up with police, get high on coca leaves and meet some wonderful locals as we battle our way across the Andes Mountains of Peru.

Episode 2. Abisko, Swedish Lapland

Abisko is situated in a national park within Lapland - a frozen, northerly winter land of reindeer, Sami people and saunas declared a UNESCO world heritage site. We start in Stockholm and fly 200 kilometers straight north above the Arctic Circle where we start the heart of our trip. Our chosen mode of transport for this journey is reindeer sleigh. After the arduous trip across the frozen north we relax for a night in the famous Ice Hotel before venturing even further north to swim in an ice hole and view the Aurora Borealis.

Episode 3. Luxor, Egypt

The exotic desert region of southern Egypt is the setting for this grass roots trip through North Africa. Our chosen form of transport here is 'Felucca' boat, the ancient trading vessel that was the heart of soul of Egypt transport and business. We travel north along the world's longest river, the Nile, from the oasis town of Aswan (ironically one of the driest places on earth with a recorded rainfall every six years on average) to the ancient city of Luxor, before finding the massive sand dunes and the nomadic communities that roam this part of Egypt that we came to meet.

Episode 4. Donsol, Philippines

Disaster and triumph set this show apart from our other journeys thus far. We start out with a near death boat disaster in the southern Philippine Sea, but bounce back resiliently and end up attaining our goal of reaching Donsol village, the whale shark capitol of the world. An unknown town - its economy was initially reliant to fishing and cottage industry alone, now benefits from higher revenue brought by the presence of these giant fish locally called 'Butanding' or gentle giants because although they look like sharks, they are considered the largest fish in the world growing up to 60 ft/18 meters. We came to see for ourselves this 'word of mouth' tourist community. Our chosen mode of transport around these tropical islands is bicycle and 'banca' boat.

Episode 5. Ryozenji temple, Shikoku, Japan

Japan is the detached land of exotic food, culture, religion and people. In this episode we shun the more famous areas, Tokyo and Kyoto, and head to the isolated, ancient island of Shikoku. Here our chosen mode of transport is walking, and our destination is detachment, personnel enlightenment, and maybe, Nirvana! Our route in this episode is the ancient 88 temple pilgrimage circuit and our rare opportunity to speak with this enclave of Zen Buddhist monks.

Episode 6. Home, Cape Breton Island, Canada

There is no better feeling than going home, and in this episode our final destination of the series, we are going 'home'. Our mode of transport here is a pick-up truck and our route is the culturally and geographically rich island of Cape Breton and the outstanding Cabot Trail. Lobster fishing, mussel farming, hooking, kayaking, kitchen parties, moose sightings, Bingo, Scottish ceilidhs, Mi'kmaq drum session, it's all going on in this episode.

Episode 7. Volcan Maderas, Isle Ometepe, Nicaragua

In this episode we realize our dream of riding motorcycles into the heart of Nicaragua. After a difficult search for motorbikes, and a humorous battle through an introductory Spanish lesson, we head through the jungle to the isolated beaches of the Pacific coast where we surf some of the best surf breaks in the world. From there, we motor back inland through some stunning Spanish-colonial towns, to the huge volcanic island of Ometepe in the center of the stunning Lake Nicaragua. Crossing the huge lake by ferry our Nicaraguan odyssey ends when we battle the mud and elevation of Volcan Maderas to reach the magical Laguna at the heart of the crater in one of the most remote areas of Nicaragua.

Episode 8. Erg Chigagga, Sahara Desert, Morocco

We return to the desert in this episode. Arriving in North African we start our Moroccan adventure in Marrakech, although a known tourist spot, it still remains largely unexplored. After wandering around the massive, ancient medina in the center of the city we find the perfect treasure box to hold the bounty we plan to bury far out in the Sahara desert. From there, we take a series of local 'Berber' taxis over the High Atlas Mountains and down into the Draa Valley until the road ends at the edge of the great sand sea of the Sahara. There, we proceed by camel and with our newfound nomad friends, head far out into the desert to find the perfect spot to bury our treasure.

Episode 9. Yorkshire Dales, England

Imagine a 7-day, 60-mile/96 km, 26 location, pub-crawl! In this episode that is exactly what we attempt to complete - legs and livers intact! Doing a traditional 'ramble' through the stunning Yorkshire Dales region of northern England (a remote area of England where only 20,000 people live on more than 1099 square mile/1769 square km of designated park). We stride through the moors and dales, peaks and valleys of rural England that has remained little changed for the more than 10,000 years of habitation. Still retaining much of the charm, beauty and character from the days of Shakespeare and Chaucer, we endure long, hard days of tramping, and fun evenings of drinking and carousing with the locals.



Episode 10. Whale Cove, Nunavut, Canada

In winter, Northern Canada is a frozen inhospitable land of snow and ice. Amongst this bleak and treacherous climate live Canada's warm-hearted and wonderful Inuit people. Heading to the far north into the Arctic to learn about the Inuit's traditional culture and incredible way of life, we accompany an elder and young hunter on a 200-mile/322 km skidoo hunt across the barren land and frozen sea ice of the treeless north. Battling blizzards, temperatures of -50C and frost bite, we learn to build an igloo, see the northern lights and feast on a buffet of raw meat, amongst other things.

Episode 11. Forbidden Kingdom of Mustang, Nepal

Very few people in the world ever get to experience visiting the Forbidden Kingdom of Mustang. Hidden quietly behind the Himalayas for hundreds of years this last bastion of Tibetan Buddhism has withstood the encroaching hand of modernization and development to remain one of the most magical and unique places on the planet. Securing special visas to enter the Kingdom of Mustang in northern Nepal, and accompanied by 10 ponies and 6 porters, we undertake a stunning, but difficult 13-day pony trek over the Himalayas to the valley of Mustang where our goal is to meet the King of Mustang and ask him why he has allowed foreigners into his country.

Episode 12. Kushtia, Bangladesh

No country is more misrepresented than Bangladesh. Seen in the world's eyes as an over-crowded land of pestilence, poverty and natural disaster, it is shunned by travelers and pitied by everyone. Traversing the country's interconnecting network of waterways by ferryboat, we travel with the locals and share in the exotic everyday life of Bangladeshi's. From shrimp baron, to peasant fishermen, lofty temple ruins to anonymous chai wallahs, we hope to show viewers how badly misrepresented this friendly and beautiful country is. Our trip culminates at Kushtia, the spiritual town and shrine of the revered saint Lalon Shah.

Episode 13 Iceberg Alley, Newfoundland, Canada

Flying a bush plane to the far-reaching tip of 'the Rock' we are back in the rugged, isolated island where we were born. Choosing kayaks as our main mode of transport for this adventure, we paddle from fishing port to fishing port before reaching 'Iceberg Alley' where we play 'chicken' with huge icebergs and breaching whales. Hanging out with colorful fishermen we re-connect with our 'Newfy' roots and landing at the spectacular lighthouse complex on isolated Quirpon Island at the very northern tip of the island. Along the way, we experience first-hand the generosity and tenacity of the locals and discover the ways in which the ingenious fishing families of Newfoundland have found a way to survive as their traditional way of life (fishing) sits on the brink of extinction.
